His Most Royal Excellency and Lord, Frederick Augustus¹, Duke of Saxony etc., Arch-Marshal of the Holy Roman Empire and Prince Elector etc., having most graciously instructed myself, Peter August von Schoenberg², Major-Domo, to arrange for the entire nameable furnishings and effects in the Prince Elector's Japanese Palace to be inventoried anew and accurately itemised, I duly commissioned Johann George Angern³, the Major-Domoship Secretary, to attend to the proper drafting of such an inventory, the latter successively putting this to effect as follows in the company of the bedmaster employed, Joseph Lechner⁴, and to record the findings in dedicated volumes, in the present instance:

I. Cupboards.

Two black Indian-lacquered cupboards, each with 2 doors and gilded fittings, 2 cbts 17 inches high with their stands, marked as **No. 20.**

[fol. 2r]

One cupboard, Indian-lacquered with raised figures in black and gilt, with two doors, each with 5 gilded-brass hinges, corner mountings and a backplate for the lock, with 10 drawers inside, each with a small gilded backplate along with a hand-grip, everything lacquered, 1 cbt 10 inches high, 1 cubit 17 inches long, 20½ inches deep. The lock is damaged. The stand has 4 turned feet and [is] likewise lacquered, 1 cubit 10 inches high, 1 cubit 20 inches long, 22 inches deep. **No. 38.**

Two like Indian cupboards, very neatly lacquered with raised figures, one of its doors cracked in the middle, each has 10 drawers inside, the two lowest of which have corner compartments and also locks, though their mouldings are rather damaged; there is a handle to both sides, 1 cubit 15 inches long, 1 cubit 8 inches high, 21 inches deep; the stand for each has 4 flowing feet along with a cross, everything lacquered, 1 cubit 9 inches high, 1 cubit 16 inches long, 22 inches deep. **No. 39.**

Two somewhat smaller ditto with the same number of drawers, to which brass handholds are attached; two iron keys for both, 1 cubit 3 inches high, 1 cubit 6 inches long, 18 inches deep, both on black-stained stands, with turned feet, 1 cubit 3 inches high, 1 cubit 6 inches long, 20 inches deep. **No. 42.**

Two small, black-and-gilt lacquered Indian cupboards, each with 2 doors and 10 gilded-brass hinges, their corners also mounted, on either side there are 2 brass handholds and on the inside 7 drawers with handholds, the bottom-most with locks, 22 inches high, 1 cbt 2 inches long, 15 inches deep, on black-and-gilt lacquered

[fol. 3r] stands with 4 turned feet, 1 cubit 12 inches high, 1 cubit 4 inches long, and 17 inches wide. **No. 43.**

Two smaller ditto without stands, with like drawers from which hang small rings, 22 inches high, 19 inches long, 13½ inches deep. **No. 44.**

Two cupboards, lacquered with raised figures in black and gilt, having gilded and enamelled hinges, locks and hand-grips along with like four-footed stands, on the inside are 10 drawers fitted with small gilded drop handles and enamelled backplates, everything lacquered in red and gilt on the inside, each cupboard 2 cubits 22 inches high

[fol. 3v] complete with its feet, 2 cubits 1 inch wide, 19½ inches deep. **No. 45.**

Two ditto cupboards, black-lacquered and mounted inside and out, on like lacquered stands, with 4 flowing feet; one is 3 cubits 5 inches high, 2 cubits 3 inches wide and 19 inches deep, the other 2 cubits 22 inches high, 2 cubits wide, 21 inches deep. **No. 46.**

One ditto lacquered and mounted cupboard that stands on 4 flowing feet and has a ribbed cornice, 2 cubits 22 inches high, 1 cubit 19 inches wide, 18½ inches deep. **No. 47.**

[fol. 4r] Two small openwork cupboards, Indian lacquered in black and gilt, that have 3 small leaves⁵ on the inside, 2 drawers at the bottom, in one a small tea tray, in the other 4 neatly lacquered boxes. The cupboards resemble two intermeshing circles, with gilded fittings, on a ditto lacquered 4-footed stand, also like lacquered case, together 16½ inches high, 17 inches long and 10½ inches wide. **No. 49.**

NB: the little boxes are rather defective.

One small cupboard, Indian-lacquered with raised figures in black and gilt, having 5 drawers and brass fittings, at the top a brass grip, 7½ inches high, 8½ inches long, and 5 inches deep. **No. 51.**

Two like cupboards on 4-footed stands, each with 2 small doors, a lockable lid and, inside, a tiny ditto lacquered shelf standing on 4 feet whilst at the bottom there are 6 drawers with ring-handles, 7¾ inches high 7¼ inches long and 4 inches deep. **No. 52.**

NB: One small lock and its key are missing.

One ditto lacquered small cupboard with lightly raised figures and 2 doors with open panels, on the inside 7 drawers, with tiny ring-handles and 1 compartment in which there is a small canister lined in gilded brass and having a flat lid with a small knop on a small lacquered shelf, 6¼ inches high, 7¼ inches long, and 3¼ inches deep. **No. 53.**

Two small ditto lacquered cupboards, each with 2 doors and a drawer, also a small hexagonal foot mounted in gilded brass with a cover. The fittings are in brass, 5¾ inches high, 6¾ inches long and 3¼ inches deep. **No. 54.**

Two like items, each with a small door at the side and on the inside 3 drawers with small ring-handles, the fittings in silvered brass, 3¾ inches high, 5 inches long and 3 inches deep. **No. 55.**

One ditto lacquered small cupboard with 2 small doors mounted in silvered brass, on the inside 6 drawers with small ring-handles, 4 inches high, 4½ inches long, 2 inches deep. **No. 56.**

One ditto lacquered and applied casket, with a small door fitted with 2 silver hinges and a small like lock with a hand-grip, on the inside 3 drawers with small silver ring-handles, 3 inches high, 4 inches long, 2½ inches deep. **No. 58.**

One neat small cupboard, Indian lacquered in black and gilt, completely open, standing on 4 feet and containing the following:

1.) At the top, one ditto lacquered drawer with no lid in which lies a grey stone with gilded edges, a small oval copper machine with a circular hole and tiny spout, and a further thin little shelf with 2 holes accommodating the 2 above items.

2.) One compartment with 2 small, silver-mounted doors and containing one small cupboard or casket standing on 4 feet that is made up of 3 stacked boxes, is $2\frac{1}{4}$ inches high, $2\frac{1}{2}$ inches long, 2 inches deep, damaged.

3.) One further empty compartment, without a door, in it a quadrangular casket with a lid, $2\frac{1}{2}$ inches high, 2 inches wide, $1\frac{3}{4}$ inches deep, additionally a small canister with a lid, and in same a hole, $2\frac{3}{4}$ inches high, $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches in diam.

4.) One compartment, in it an oblong casket with an out-curving lid, ditto lacquered, $1\frac{3}{4}$ inches high, $3\frac{3}{4}$ inches long, 3 inches deep.

5.) One compartment within which stands an Indian game made up of the following. One casket containing a pair of tiny silver tweezers, 3 silver needles, a further like with a circular plate and another with a small rose and brass stem, surmounting this casket is another containing 10 miniscule quadrangular lacquered caskets, each with 12 jacaranda counters marked with gilded characters. 2 of the counters are missing. On top of this casket lies a lacquered plate divided into 10 compartments into each of which a rose in mother-of-pearl has been fitted and to one side above this there is an elongated lidded casket.

6.) A further drawer, in it a small oblong shelf, lacquered in brown on both sides, that is $3\frac{1}{2}$ inches long.

The entire cupboard is $8\frac{1}{2}$ inches high inclusive of its ledge, $9\frac{1}{2}$ inches long and 4 inches deep; It has, however, suffered extensive damage. **No.**

59.

[fol. 7v] One ditto lacquered small cupboard, though defective, stands on 4 feet and contains:

- 1.) One drawer with a small silver ring-handle,
- 2.) One open compartment in which stands a lidded casket made up of 3 boxes fitted inside each other,
3 inches high, 2½ inches long, 2 inches deep,
- 3.) A further open compartment containing a small shelf and, on top of same, a lined canister with a lid and small knop, 2 inches high,
- 4.) A further drawer, each with a small silver ring-handle.

Overall the cupboard is 7¼ inches high, 8½ inches long and 3½ inches deep. **No. 60.**

One small cupboard, Saxon-lacquered in white, with 3 drawers and cut-out copper-plate engravings applied in polychrome, 15 inches high, 22½ inches long, damaged. **No. 216.**

[fol. 8r] One keyless celadon-lacquered cupboard on a flowing foot with 2 doors and gilded fittings, on the inside 10 drawers and in the middle a tiny door, is 3 cubits high with its foot, and 1 cubit 18 inches wide, badly damaged. **No. 243.**

One small cupboard, Indian-lacquered in black, with lightly raised ornament, 2 small doors and, on the inside, 4 drawers, 10 inches high 7½ inches wide. **No. 250.**

One small triangular cupboard with a door and applied with copious figures in soapstone, 1 cubit 8 inches high, 22 inches wide. **No. 80.**

[fol. 8v] One small cupboard, Indian-lacquered in black and overlaid with silk flowers in polychrome, with 4 drawers and gilded fittings, 10 inches high, 11½ inches wide. **No. 188.**

Four tables, Saxon-lacquered in red, gilt and scattered glitter, 2 cubits 6 inches long, 1 cubit 10 inches wide. **No. 22.** Differ.

One ditto, 1 cubit 10 inches high, 1 cubit 15 inches wide, 1 cubit 2 inches long. **No. 23.**

One black-lacquered table with a flowing gilded foot, 1 cubit 18 inches long, 1 cubit 1 inch wide. **No. 25.**

Two ditto lacquered tables with gilded quadrangular feet, 2 cubits long, 1 cubit 4 inches wide. **No. 27.**

One table, plainly lacquered in red and gilt, with octagonal turned feet and a drawer with truncated circular corners, 1 cubit 12 inches long, 1 cubit 1 inch wide. **No. 28.**

Two small, white-and-gilt lacquered tables with lightly raised figures and small quadrangular feet along with a drawer, 1 cubit 10 inches high, 1 cubit 3 inches wide, 1 cubit 15 inches long. **No. 1.**

Two small, oval, fold-down tables Saxon-lacquered in black and gilt, each with a scalloped concave moulding and circular turned foot, with 3 arms, 1 cubit 16 inches long, 1 cubit 6 inches wide. **No. 2.**

One table, Saxon-lacquered with scattered glitter, silver figures and painted ornament, with a drawer, on a 4-footed cross-frame, 2 cubits long, 1 cubit 8 inches wide. **No. 3.**

Two tables domestically⁷ lacquered with lightly raised figures in red and gilt, also 4-footed stands, 1 cubit 18 inches long, 1 cubit 2 inches wide.

One oval white board into which Chinese figures have been hewn, 1 cbt 19 inches long 1 cbt 3½ inches wide.

Two quadrangular ditto embellished with Chinese figures and diverse ornament, 1 cbt 11 inches long, 1 cbt 4 inches wide.

One board in red porphyry, 1 cubit 23 inches long, 21 inches wide.

One large board veneered with yellow-and-brown mottled marble, 3 cbts 3 inches long 1 cbt 13¾ inches wide, its rim defective,
[*re this and the previous No.*, A: <held in reserve> Both these boards passed by high decree to the Cabinet of Antiques on 6 July 1830. Friedrich Nollain¹⁰.]

Two marble pillar table tops, beautifully veneered, each 2 cbts 2 inches long, 1 cubit 1 inch wide, 1 defective. [A: These two tables were moved to Pillnitz on 19 April 1830. Nollain.]

Three marble bases.

Four busts in plaster of Paris, viz.:

Duke Ernest II in Gotha¹¹,

Duke Augustus in Gotha¹², [*re both items*] both modelled by Doell¹³ in Gotha.

Frederick William, Crown-Prince¹⁴,

Elizabeth Louise, Crown-Princess [*re both items*] in Prussia¹⁵, both modelled by Rauch¹⁶ in Berlin.

Guéridons.

Four guéridons on lion's paw feet, mostly Saxon-lacquered in gold and red, with hexagonal tops and Indian spoon-billed geese¹⁷, 2 cubits 7 inches high, 15 inches in diam., are damaged. **No. 14.**

Four guéridons with tortoises, coconut trees and circular tops, mostly Saxon-lacquered in blue and gilt, standing on 3 feet, 2 cbts 7 inches high, 15 inches in diam., are similarly defective. **No. 15.**

Six mostly green-and-gilt lacquered guéridons with monkeys seated beneath fruit trees and circular tops, 2 cubits 6 inches high and 15 inches in diam. **No. 16.**

Four guéridons with Indian faces and 3 entwined whales, mostly Saxon-lacquered in red and scattered gold, 2 cubits 6 inches high 15 inches in diam. **No. 17.**

Four ditto Saxon-lacquered guéridons, with Indian busts and circular tops, 2 cbts 6 inches high, 15 inches in diam. **No. 18.**

Six lacquered guéridons with circular tops, 2 cubits 6 inches high, 15 inches in diam. **No. 19.**

Six green-and-gilt lacquered guéridons with circular tops, 2 cbts 6 inches high and 14½ inches in diam. **No. 20.**

One carved and lacquered girandole, on a foot with a tortoise, has 6 arms and double brass nozzles, with winged cockerels, frogs and copious snakes on the arms, 1 cubit high 18 inches wide, very defective. **No. 23.**

One black-and-gilt lacquered Indian casket mounted in gilded brass, 5½ inches high, 16½ inches long, 11½ inches deep, rather damaged. **No. 65.**

One quadrangular red-lacquered casket with a sliding lid, lacquered in black inside and having a small shelf with an opening, 6 inches high, 7¼ inches long, 5 inches wide. **No. 67.**

One black-and-gilt Saxon-lacquered casket on 4 gilded small knobs or feet with gilded and enamelled fittings and a like insert with 2 gilded hand-grips, 11 inches high, 21 inches long, 15 inches wide. **No. 107.**

One lengthy, plainly lacquered casket, 3¼ inches high, 9 inches long, 6 inches wide. **No. 109.**

One black-and-gilt Indian-lacquered casket containing 8 Indian ink sticks, 10¾ inches long, and 4¼ inches wide. **No. 117.** [A: According to Bedmaster Lechner¹⁹, these ink sticks are the 87 items entered on fol. 20b.]

One casket, neatly overlaid with mother-of-pearl and Indian-lacquered in brown and scattered glitter, comprising 4 black-lacquered caskets with lids, all four together are 11 inches high, 9 inches wide and 9½ inches long. **No. 119.**

Two black-and-gilt lacquered caskets, each with a partition and small lid, 1¼ inches high, 3 inches in diam., lying in each 10 circular gamin chips in mother-of-pearl and 6 like little fish. **No. 161.**

Ten Indian black-lacquered caskets of varying size containing copious ink sticks. **No. 170.**

One Indian ditto with various Indian ink sticks. **No. 171.**

[*Note in Margin, re Nos. 170 and 171, A:*] There are a total of 87 differing ink sticks in these 11 caskets. The 11 caskets and 87 ink sticks entered alongside were recorded during stocktaking in 1820.

[*Note attached, re No. 171, fol. 21r, in C:*] These 87 ink sticks belong in the 11 black lacquered boxes, which are in the basement. However, the ink sticks were placed in the box of French porcelain for safekeeping by order of Senior Chamberlain Friesen.²⁰

Two small black-lacquered Indian caskets, the lid at the top overlaid with silk flowers, though with gilded paper on the inside, 2½ inches high, 7

One red casket, lacquered in polychrome colours, housing a drawer with a writing set and a small lock, mounted, 3½ inches high, 11½ inches long, 10½ inches wide. **No. 236.**

Two caskets in cardboard painted with Indian figures that fit inside each other, the larger 4½ inches long, 1½ inches high and 3 inches wide. **No. 16.**

[A: All the above lacquered items excluding the 11 caskets containing ink sticks set out above were retained when this inventory was presented to the Electoral Major-Domoship. J. F. Kindler²¹.]
